



MEET THE JUROR

As different as the end result might be, the basics of making a print are nearly the same:

- Pick a matrix (ex: wood, metal, stone, silk)
- Create a design (etch it, draw it, carve it, burn it) on its surface
- Ink, print and reproduce that single design over and over.








*QR stands for "quick response". This unique graphic image contains information that can be read using a smartphone application and will take you immediately to a related website.



MAKE A STAMP PRINT





- Sticky-back art foam sheet (Hobby Lobby or Michael's)
- Card board or foam core
- Paint (tempera or acrylic)
- Scissors
- Paper
- Paint brush







Make your stamp

- Cut out shapes from a sheet of the sticky-back foam
- Peel and stick the shapes onto a piece of cardboard

Make your print

- Pour a small amount of paint onto foam plate.
- Dip or brush paint onto the stamp and press onto the paper.
- Use your stamps to make an image or pattern. What will you make?
